## Some 125 entries and 3,000 parade participants make 2012 Pomona Christmas Parade true community event

Pomona's annual Christmas Parade, presented by the Downtown Pomona Owners Association, was bigger and better than ever this month as some 3,000 parade participants marched or rode down Second Street in Downtown Pomona and an estimated 5,000 Pomona residents and others lined the streets to enjoy floats, bands and more.

The parade – the fourth annual parade after moving back to Second Street – was revived in Downtown Pomona in 2009 when it returned to its original downtown location for the first time in 40 years.

This year's parade included some 125 individual entries with everything from horses and motorcycles to Penelope the pig from Danny's Farm at Cal Poly Pomona.

Grand marshal this year was Olympics gold medal winner in skeet shooting Kimberly Rhode, a

Cal Poly Pomona alumna and the first American in history to win individual medals in five consecutive Olympic Games.

She was also the first woman to win three gold medals in Olympic shooting.

## Pomona City Council adds two new faces, agrees to work together for good of the city

It was speeches, goodbyes, and swearing in ceremonies all around at a special Pomona City Council meeting last week as two new and two re-elected office holders became official and a new council started on a path that re-elected Mayor Elliott Rothman described as "Pomona first."

"Finally on the radar we have stability," Rothman said, adding that the city will continue to be fiscally conservative.

"We work hard with what we've got," he added.

Rothman pointed to the 60 percent vote Measure X received in support of a new library tax and said

## Dinner out? We've got just the spot, right here in Pomona!

It may be the best restaurant Pomona has to offer but, just to be safe, we're going to let you judge for yourself. Either way, La Nueva Voz enjoyed dinner at McKinley's Grille last month and we would definitely recommend it to anyone looking for the right spot for that special event or just a special night out.

In the interest of full disclosure, we have visited McKinley's many times before – mainly for lunch but, from time to time, a quiet breakfast meeting or a special dinner. This was the first time they actually knew we were coming with a camera and notebook in hand.

The restaurant is tucked away inside the Sheraton Fairplex Hotel at McKinley and White Avenues and features both fine dining and a full bar. When

we were there, we had no trouble being seated.

During slow periods, most diners are guests staying at the hotel – they automatically ask for your room number so they can bill the meal to your room. (I told them they could bill the meal

to room 234, but that we weren't staying at the hotel.)

The service was great and our selections were top notch – all because of the combination of a professional staff (from the kitchen to the table) and a professional executive chef, David Teig, even though Teig was on vacation the night we were there.

Manager Tim Kelly and our server, Melissa Hershey, took excellent care of us beginning with a glass of house cabernet (a brand called "Little Black Dress" from Pasadena – seriously, that was the name) and, for Renee Barbee, our director of advertising, a glass of Jacob's Creek Moscato, from Australia, which she said was both very sweet and very good.

We also enjoyed McKinley's own homemade potato chips and special dip, compliments of the chef.

Our salads were part of McKinley's "farm to table" produce offering, using only hand-harvested fruits and vegetables grown on the restaurant's own McKinley's Urban Farm, a one-acre parcel on the grounds at Fairplex.

I enjoyed the Greek salad and Renee ordered a special mixed greens salad with shredded carrots and onions.

Interestingly, the restaurant manager mentioned he started his career as an intern at radio station KMAK in Fresno, a country western station, while majoring in radio and television at California State University, Fresno. (Even so, we didn't let him help us write this review and we didn't notice any country music in the restaurant during our dinner.)

Getting down to business, I went with the stewed lamb shank (you literally will not need a knife) and Renee selected the grilled eight-ounce choice filet mignon.

Vegetables included potatoes, carrots, zucchini and yellow squash.

While we were there on Thanksgiving weekend, the restaurant was already decorated for the holidays – both inside and out. What can only be described as a quiet and stately ambience was complemented by soft piped-in piano music.

Other selections on the menu include everything from short rib ravioli and grilled mahi mahi to line caught seared swordfish.

Prices range from \$16 for an eight ounce Wagyu beef burger to \$36 for the filet.

Order our selections including wine and a 20 percent gratuity and you can get out the door for just under \$100.

We enjoyed the evening and we like the fact that it is right here in Pomona – no need to drive to Chino Hills, Brea or Pasadena for a nice evening out.

## Close race at Three Valleys puts Pomona's Fred Lantz back on board

Pomona's "too close to call" race in the Three Valleys Municipal Water District election reversed the unofficial election night tally in the final count, returning Fred Lantz to his Division 6 (North Pomona) seat on the board defeating incumbent John Mendoza by only 130 votes.

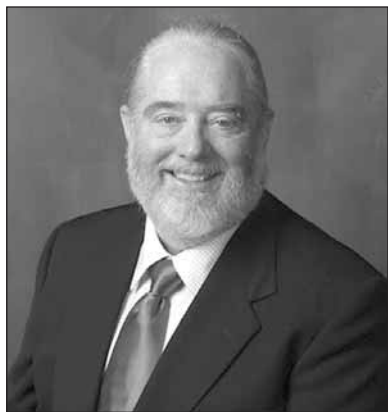
The final tally, posted nearly a month later on Dec. 2 after the Nov. 6 election once all absentee and provisional ballots were counted, showed Lantz had 6,144 votes (37.5 percent).

Mendoza received 6,014 votes (36.71 percent) and Jerry Perez received 4,226 (25.79 percent).

A total of 29,973 voters were registered in the district of 32 precincts.

Lantz served eight years on the Three Valleys board before losing to Mendoza four years ago.

Pomona has two representatives on the Three Valleys board. Carlos

Goytia represents South Pomona (Division 1) and will be up for election in another two years.

Three Valleys is the wholesale water agency serving Pomona and other cities in Eastern Los Angeles County from Azusa and Covina to Hacienda Heights, Rowland Heights and Claremont.

that while a two-thirds majority was required for its passage, he said he saw that as a signal that the city's "top priority is to keep our library open and working."

The mayor thanked his supporters including "Team Rothman" (his wife, Pam, and son, Jason, president of the Pomona Unified School District Board), and he thanked the city's commissioners and staff mem-

bers for their service.

"I see this as one big vote of confidence," he added, and said he will not change the way he does business.

Newly elected Councilmember John Nolte said, "This is kind of surreal," and thanked his family for their support. Nolte, a special education attorney, said he became involved in Pomona as a law student

when he volunteered for the Pomona Economic Opportunity Center (Day Labor Center), and added he has been there ever since. Today, he is Board Chairman of the organization.

He said he will work for safe streets, good jobs, and a healthy environment.

"I promise I will do my best," he said.

And new Councilmember Debra Martin, who said she dedicated the evening to her late mother and fa-

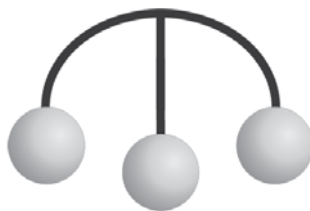

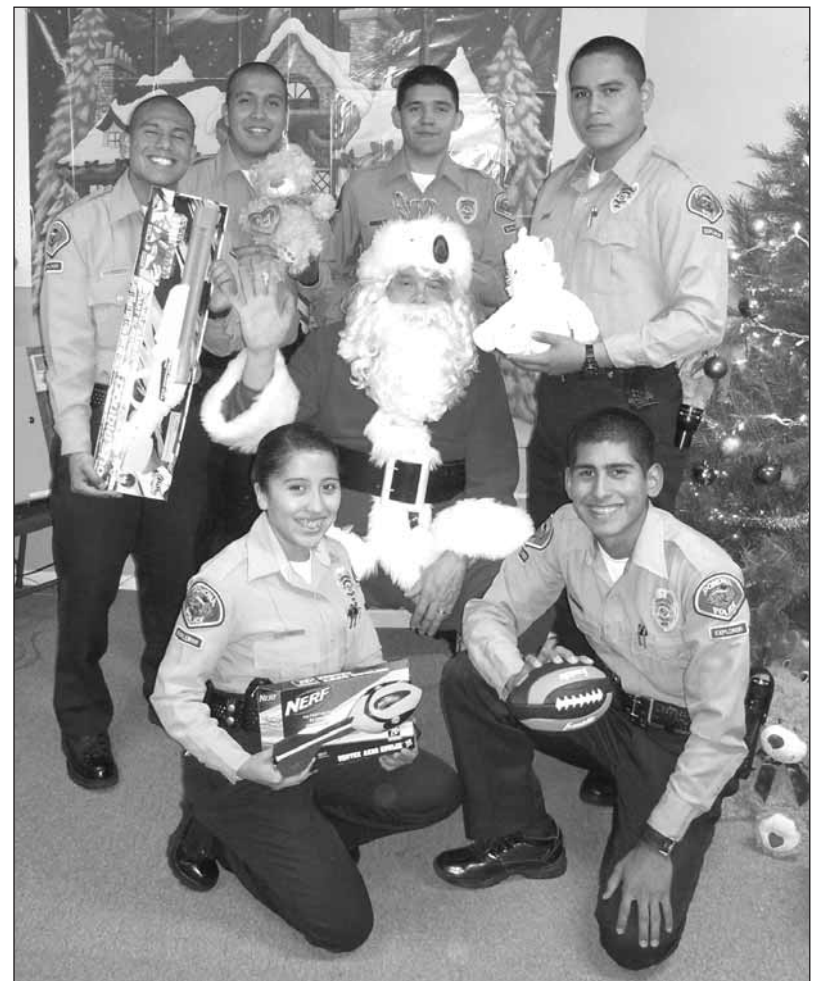

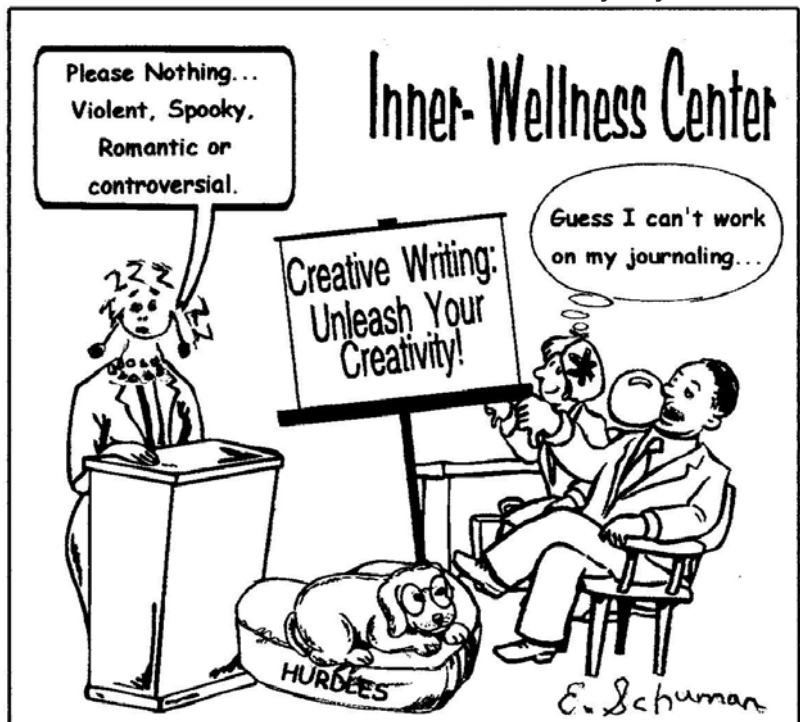

## Greg Sharp, curator of Wally Parks NHRA Motorsport Museum, honored with prestigious automotive journalism award

### Western University, University of La Verne enter into partnership for nursing students

Pomona's Western University of Health Sciences and the University of La Verne have entered into a new partnership to send qualified ULV students to Western's College of Graduate Nursing's Master of Science in Nursing – Entry program.

The “linkage” agreement was signed this month by Western's Provost and COO Dr. Gary Gugelchuk, ULV President Devorah Lieberman, ULV Vice Provost Homa Shabahang and Western's College of Graduate Nursing Dean Karen Hanford.

“When I first came to the university I met with President (Philip) Pumerantz and it became apparent the two universities are in each other's backyard,” Lieberman said. “There are ways to bridge us that have not existed before and there are ways to extend bridges that existed before and this is just one more example of how our universities are working together to benefit the students.”

ULV will nominate students for the program, typically in their junior year, and a College of Graduate Nursing admission committee will interview the candidates. As many as three applicants per year will be admitted to the program.

Other qualified students also may have an opportunity for an interview at the end of their ULV program.

Students admitted to the linkage program will be assigned a faculty adviser, and they will have opportunities to visit the Western University campus, participate in school activities and network with nursing students.

The program will allow ULV students to explore the nursing profession further while discovering what the program has to offer.

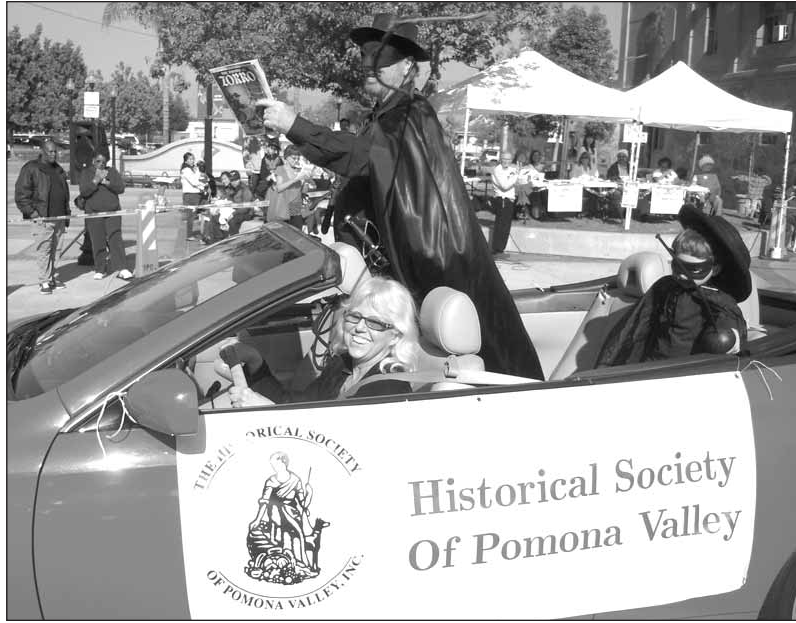


